This month we are highlighting two Canadian books, brand new to our library. Well-known gardener Marjorie Harris has written *Thrifty Gardening From the Ground Up* (635 Har), in which she shows how you can create a lovely garden without breaking the bank. This is an excellent book for gardeners at any stage of life, and is particularly helpful if you are making big changes to your garden or making a move to a new home.

Bugs can be both good and bad for your garden. Lone Pine has published *Garden Bugs of Ontario: Gardening to Attract, Repel and Control* (595.709713 Fos) by Leslie Foster. The large detailed drawings should help you to identify bugs, and the page of information on each bug will tell you what it does in your garden and how to invite it to stay or chase it away, as needed.

- NEW OR EXPERIENCED

Our speaker tonight, Simon Lunn, has offered PDHS members a great deal. He is offering two garden photography workshops - one in May and one later on in the summer.

Using a garden as your palette, Simon Lunn will introduce or re-acquaint participants with tips and important principles and techniques to use in photographing gardens, flora and fauna included. His approach will include group sessions and one-on-one guidance, and will be designed primarily for beginner to intermediate or enthusiast level photographers. Gardening Tips for the Older Gardener

A few warm-up exercises get you going.

Keep it small and simple: grow fewer plants, those you like and which require less maintenance.

Choose plants that fit the conditions of your garden: full-sun, sun/shade, clay, sandy. Plant those requiring more water near a downspout.

Keep garden near house: easier to water, weed and easily use spare moments of time

'Easy" Plants include: hosta, hydrangea, lamb's ear, Solomon's seal, lilyturf, catmint, boxwood, siberian iris, coral bells, sedum

Branches and weeds are easier to pull on a tarp than push in a wheelbarrow. A two-handled kneeler makes it easier to get up and down without losing your balance. Some raised beds and/or planting in containers makes it unnecessary to have to crouch so much. Pace yourself. Better to do a little at a time, than pushing through.

A series of tips on garden photography.

Learn To See What's Really There

Look carefully through the viewfinder before you shoot. Learn to see what the camera sees. Don't just see what you want to see; look at what's really there. Instead of focusing on the part of the picture you like, consciously look for anything that you wouldn't want to be in the scene. Are there telephone wires in the top of the frame? Do the elements of the picture collide in confusing ways? (Tree branches growing out of a person's head in a careless portrait is a classic example.)

Many of these composition problems are easy to fix. Stepping a few inches to the left or right, tilting the camera up or down, or lowering your point of view closer to the ground can eliminate unwanted elements. Once you've made adjustments, examine the frame again, from edge to edge and corner to corner. You can crop distracting details out of the print later, but you should rely on cropping only as a last resort.
